Overview: Waterville Valley Academy is a snowsports academy designed for full-time student athletes in grades 9-12 and Post-Graduates who are dedicated to pursuing the highest level of performance in alpine racing, freestyle skiing, freeskiing and snowboarding in parallel with an individualized academic program delivered by WVA faculty. This full-term high school has grown out of our traditional ski academy's Winter Term program that has been offered since the Academy was formed in 1972. WVA is operated by Waterville Valley Black and Blue Trail Smashers / Snowsports Educational Foundation, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit registered in the state of New Hampshire. Our website is www.gowva.org.

Mission: We develop and educate snowsports athletes by cultivating passion through world-class training and innovative learning environments, allowing each student to maximize his or her potential athletically, academically and in life.

Academic Program: College Preparatory

The Town: Waterville Valley, incorporated in 1829, is a small town surrounded by six, four thousand foot peaks in the middle of the White Mountain Forest. The full time population of 260 residents expands to 6,000 during the busy seasons of winter and summer. In 1965, Tom Corcoran founded the Waterville Company, Inc. to create a premier year-round resort including the alpine ski area, a 9-hole golf course, 18 clay tennis courts, trail systems for Nordic skiing, mountain biking and hiking, Corcoran's pond and water activities.
